The network supplies ento-organic fertilizer that is 20% more efficient than traditional fertilizers.



The fertilizer employs a conversion process using black soldier fly larvae to convert organic household waste into fertilizers, based on the principles of circular economy.



The network empowers women farmers to raise their voices and provides access to training on farm management, pest control, and financing.



Their aim is to ensure that women farmers have better access to farm inputs and credits despite the barriers that remain in the sector.

Patience Dordor, a beneficiary of the Ento Women Network is a farmer in the rural community of Kasoa, Ghana. Like most female farmers, she has been an advocate of breaking down barriers of gender inequality in the agricultural sector such as lack of financial aid.
